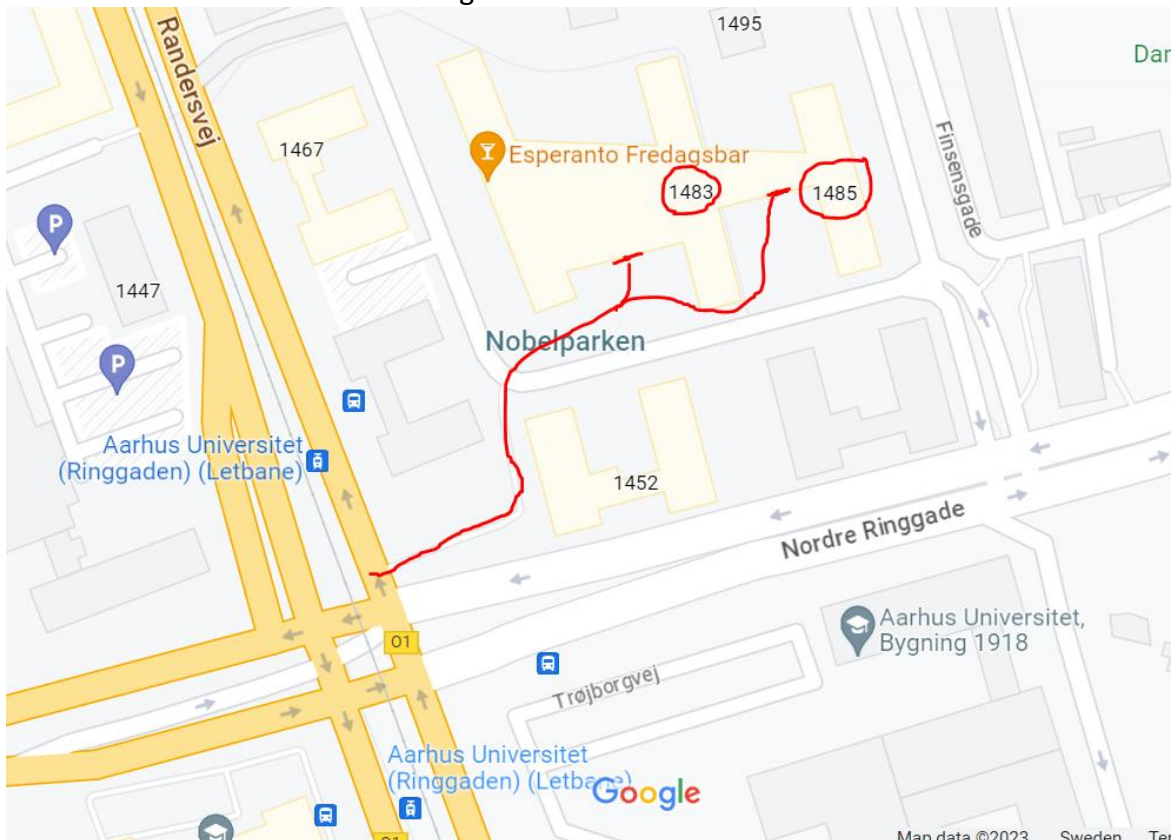

Practical information

Location

Linguistics is located in Nobelparken on Jens Chr. Skous Vej along with many other humanities studies (ARTS). Nobelparken is the large red buildings located at the intersection of Randersvej/Nørrebrogade and Nordre Ringgade. I have marked the buildings we are going to be in on both days on the map below. I have circled the building numbers and made two lines that indicate where to enter the building.



Food

I will provide breakfast both days but do bring your own lunch both days. There is also the option to purchase food and drinks at the Nobelparken canteen (however this can be quite expensive), the canteen at the Kongelig Bibliotek (better prices) or in the nearby supermarket.

What to bring

You don't need to bring a computer, as all PowerPoint slides shown during the intro days will be sent out afterwards. On Monday there will be a campus tour which will take us outside, and Tuesday there will be activities outdoors, so please bring clothes appropriate for the weather.

IT systems

That's okay, and you'll get the hang of the systems during your first time on the programme. After the intro days, there will also be an IT workshop where the real experts will guide you through it all! Below we've put together a quick overview of the main systems:

mitstudie.au.dk

MitStudie is the single-entry point to tuition, study information, and self-service systems. Here you will find the weekly timetable, your AU e-mail, important messages, links to sites and systems and much more. In fact, you only need to log in to mitstudie.au.dk, because from here you can access everything you need as a student.

[Brightspace](#)

Brightspace is an e-learning platform where your lecturers upload materials and other relevant information for your teaching.

[Student Self Service \(STADS\)](#)

STADS is the place where you can view your exam results, order exam transcripts, etc. It is also where you register for courses and exams when needed during your studies. See guide on using STADS.

[Studyportal Arts](#)

These are the websites where all relevant information about tuition, exams, rules, guidance, etc. is gathered.

[Eduroam](#)

The wireless network at AU is called Eduroam. Before you can use it, you need to install the network on your devices.

[Zoom on AU](#)

This is the primary technical solution AU uses to deliver teaching and exams digitally. You should always use the official AU Zoom instance and not the free version. Use the AU video conferencing guide in Zoom.

Guidance and advising

As a student at Aarhus University, you have a wide range of opportunities to find help, support, inspiration, and guidance, regardless of where you are in your studies:

[Student counseling](#)

All study programs have their own student counselor. This is a fellow student who is employed to help and guide other students. Student counselling is confidential and you can come and talk about the rules and formalities of your studies, doubts about your study, personal challenges, and much more. The student counselor will visit us during the intro days, and in the following weeks, he/she will give you various presentations with information relevant to the MA program.

[Studenterpræsterne](#) (the student chaplains)

The student chaplains in Aarhus offer talks and discussion groups for students of all faiths and religious beliefs. They also have a quiet room at Aarhus University where you can pray, meditate or just find peace. The student chaplains also organise various lectures and debates.

[Studenterrådgivningen](#)

Studenterrådgivningen are experts in short-term therapy for students in higher education. They can help you, for example, if you have challenges with exam anxiety, perfectionism, stress, etc.

[Studenterlinjen](#)

Studenterlinjen is an anonymous telephone support service for students. Studenterlinjen is run by volunteers who themselves are students and who have received training in communication and topics like stress, depression, anxiety, and loneliness.

Initiatives at Linguistics at AU

Linguistics at AU has a great tradition of arranging events that bring students together across semesters and create a great community. Here you can read about some of the organisations at Linguistics.

Lingoland is a student space for linguists in building 1485, room 515. All students have free access to this room. The room is used daily for group work, workshops, meetings, general "hygge". As a linguistics student, you will spend a lot of time in Lingoland.

ViGør is Linguistic's activity committee and they organize linguistics-related activities with coffee and cake every Friday afternoon. These activities include student talks, where students talk about their assignments and projects or master's students talk about their thesis, and Friday lectures, where lecturers, researchers, and Ph.D. students talk about their work. Sometimes we also watch a film that has linguistic relevance, play games, or do other fun stuff. All events are voluntary to

attend, but there is always a great turnout and it provides a great opportunity to get to know students from other years - also it's great fun! You can find ViGør on Facebook and see some of the events that have taken place.

[KOMMAbar](#) is a joint Friday bar for Linguistics, Scandinavian Studies, and several other subjects. It is located in 1485-137 and is usually open every Friday. During the day, the room of KOMMAbar is used for group meetings, workspace, study space, etc.

[Lingoblog](#): Lingoblog.dk is a platform that communicates content about language and linguistics to all interested in language. Lingoblog is edited by teachers, PhD students and MA students from Linguistics, Cognitive Semiotics and Nordic studies at Aarhus University. Lingoblog publishes blogs in (until now) five languages once a week.

Uddannelsesnævnet (UN), the Board of Studies (UN), together with the Uddannelsesnævnet (SN), is the voice of the students in the department and faculty. It includes student representatives from all programmes, lecturers, heads of department, student counsellors and the student administration. Linguistics is in the Education Board together with Cognitive Semiotics, and Cognitive Science under the name LICS. Above this, LICS is represented in the IKK study committee by a student representative and a lecturer. The primary task of LICS and IKK is to ensure the quality of our programs. UN and SN is where we look at evaluations, decide which courses to offer, change exam forms, and a lot of other things. In LICS, everyone is welcome to attend the monthly meetings, which are announced on our Facebook page Education Board LICS.

The newsletter (NHB) is published every Monday and is the place to keep up to date with all the professional and social activities going on. The newsletter includes important information about exams, year-end meetings, guest lectures, job postings, conferences, quizzes with prizes and much, much more.
